Who Queenie was, and who she'd become, were not at all clear when she arrived at the APL. Queenie's owner abandoned her. A neighbor looked after her for a month or so; when it became clear the owners were not coming back, the neighbor contacted the APL to surrender Queenie.

Queenie was very shy when she arrived. Slowly, she began to interact with people and go outside for walks. After about a month, it looked like her time had come, and she was adopted. Unfortunately, when left unattended and uncrated, Queenie became stressed and tore things up in the house. Her adopters brought her back to the APL.

Over the next few months, Queenie began to be more comfortable and less fearful and she was adopted again! Unfortunately, that adopter returned her in less than a week. Queenie, the adopter reported, was not a good fit for their family; she was hard for the pregnant adopter

to walk, wouldn't eat unless she was alone, and was reluctant to go outside.



Paws for an Update

Letter from the President and CEO

What's in a name? Well, if you're talking about animal shelters of today, a whole lot!

Historically, shelters have been places where lost, unwanted, abandoned, or displaced animals went to live for a short amount of time until a relatively quick, cut-and-dried decision was made about whether they would live or die. Today, many shelters are morphing into places where homeless or underserved animals go for lifesaving treatment and care that may prevent their surrender to a shelter and homelessness. Decision-making has become much more complex.

As recently as 15 years ago, the Cleveland APL could barely keep up with the massive flow of homeless animals coming into our shelter. Good, basic care was provided to only the most adoptable animals that could move through quickly so there would be space for the next influx of animals from the community. Healthy, friendly animals were losing their lives simply because there were too many. Animals that had medical issues rarely could be saved. The euthanasia rate was high. Veterinary care consisted primarily of spaying and neutering adoptable animals and providing limited treatment to a limited number of animals. The people working at the Cleveland APL were animal-loving heroes who were doing their level best to manage a heartbreaking problem that was not of their making, and they did not have the support or resources to address from a lifesaving standpoint.

Fast forward to today. We still often refer to the Cleveland APL as a shelter—it's a hard habit to break—but we have become so much more than a shelter. Over the past decade, with your support, a passionate, talented team of staff members and volunteers, and a lifesaving vision, we have been able to implement an array of progressive, preventive, lifesaving programs. Programs like Trap-Neuter-Return, which has dramatically reduced

the number of stray, community cats coming into the APL and provided these unadoptable, unsocial cats with a lifesaving alternative. Programs like project CARE and Peticaid, which has allowed us to provide resources to low-income pet owners living in Cleveland and keep these animals with the people they love and who love them—and out of a shelter. Programs like the Second Chance Program, which allows us to provide an unbelievable level of medical and surgical treatment to every safely and humanely treatable animal in our care, not just the most adoptable. I could go on!

The Cleveland APL is not just a shelter anymore. Yes, we still proudly provide temporary shelter to homeless animals or victims of abuse and find them new homes. We always will. But as the needs of the animals in our care and the animals and people in our community change, so must our work. We must begin to envision the Cleveland APL as an "animal resource center" for our community, where we will not only provide temporary shelter for animals who have lost their homes, but also provide the support and resources necessary to keep at-risk animals from becoming homeless and allow them to stay with the families that love them. In the months ahead, I look forward to sharing with you our exciting plans for responding to these changing needs of our "shelter" animals and the at-risk pets in our community.

So, what's in a name? These days, when referring to the Cleveland APL, I'd say quite a lot!

Thank you for making this lifesaving journey possible.

"destructive" activity to de-stuffing her toys and shredding paper while Megan is at work. When Megan gets home, it's all belly rubs and cuddles.



Project CARE Helps Keep Loving Families Together!

The Cleveland APL's project CARE (Community Animal Retention Effort) works to provide support for pet owners with the goal of helping owners in the City of Cleveland retain their pets during times of hardship. There are countless animals and families that have been helped thanks to all of the services provided through project CARE. Families like Dexter and his mom Migna and Talupa and her mom Delores have been kept together despite issues that may have otherwise caused owners to surrender their pets.

Migna had already spent hundreds of dollars in the past year on vet care to treat Dexter's skin allergies—but nothing that was prescribed helped. She felt helpless and simply wanted to make her sweet dog feel better. She came to the Cleveland APL for help from project CARE. Our veterinary team started him on a different medication and within a month, Dexter's skin had improved, and Migna could sleep well knowing he was receiving excellent and effective care!

This summer, a fire broke out in an apartment building leaving Delores and her dog, Talupa, in need of assistance and a place to go. When the APL team received a call from the Red Cross, we were happy to do what we could to help displaced residents and their pets during this time of need. Thankfully, Talupa was able to stay with a family member while Delores had to stay at a Red Cross shelter until she found a new home where she could take Talupa.

Thank you Fox 8 for hosting Dick Goddard's APL Telethon

The fourth annual Dick Goddard's APL Telethon aired on Fox 8 on Thursday, September 13. This fantastic event was hosted by Fox 8 personalities Todd Meany and Natalie Herbick. Between 6 a.m. and 7:30 p.m., Fox 8 viewers saw vignettes that featured some of the amazing animals who were in our care. The segments also showcased the meaningful and life-saving work that takes place at the Cleveland APL every day.

The event brought together the community and inspired viewers to make a donation to help the more than 13,000 animals who are served by the Cleveland APL every year.

We are happy to report that more than \$140,000 was raised to support our mission and important work. A total of 185 people gave their time as volunteers, including 146 phone bank workers who spoke to the animal-loving viewers who called to make a donation. In addition, a special Fox 8 adoption promotion for dogs, cats and kittens—an \$88 adoption fee for adult dogs and an \$8 adoption fee for cats and \$50 for kittens—resulted in 35 animals finding new homes that day!

More than 400 guests helped us to raise more than \$288,000 to benefit the APL's Second Chance Program during the Cleveland Animal Protective League's annual gala on Saturday, October 20, at the InterContinental Hotel in Cleveland.

Guests had a great time and enjoyed "paws-ing" at the many food stations as well as bidding on fabulous items in our live and silent auctions. They also learned about some very special animals whose lives were saved because of the medical care and expertise the Second Chance Program allows us to provide.

Javen, a three-month-old Husky/ Hound mix who was transferred to the Cleveland APL after suffering from serious wounds from an embedded collar, was the night's VIP (Very Important Pooch). When he first arrived at the APL, he had lesions that were moist with yellow discharge, which meant he also had an infection. Over the course of five weeks, Javen had to undergo two surgeries. Today Javen is a healthy, happy puppy with

a family who adores him and a new name to match this new chapter in his life—Dustin. Also featured in videos at the event were Finch, a poor puppy who came in extremely dehydrated, suffering from anemia, a skin infection and severely underweight; Lala, a stray cat who suffered from two hernias which caused her organs to shift into her chest and the fold of her leg; and Tiny, who suffered from violent seizures because he was coated in flea medication.

A committed group of APL volunteers works on the gala all year long. Committee chairs Angela DeMuesy, Patti De Rosa, Jeff Eisenberg, Olivia Houck, Barbara Reitzloff, Ginny Russ and Christine Snyder donated their time to this event. Without their hard work, and the hard work of the many volunteers who helped during the gala, Fur Ball would not be possible!

Blueberry Shakes His Blues

When Blueberry, nicknamed Blue, first arrived at the APL in the spring of 2018, he had plenty of reason to be sad. The two-year-old lab/shepherd mix had been shot in the rear leg. The bone had splintered, and Blue suffered nerve damage as well. The APL's Humane Investigations team rescued Blue, and brought him to the APL so he could get medical attention.

The veterinary staff examined Blue and determined that the damage caused by the gunshot was extensive; Blue's leg would have to be amputated. The APL veterinarian was prepared to perform the surgery and get Blue back on his paws again. While Blueberry might not seem lucky, in one respect he was. He is one of the animals who, just a few years ago, might have not been able to have the surgery he needed.

The cost of providing care for the thousands of sick, injured and special-needs animals who arrive on the doorstep of the APL every year is constantly increasing. And yet, we believe they deserve a second chance. Fortunately, the Second Chance Program, funded solely by donations, has allowed the APL to provide more animals every year with the surgery, medications and therapy

necessary to give them a chance not only to survive, but to heal and start a new, healthy life with a loving family. Blueberry was just one of

thousands of lucky animals.

Blue got the surgery he needed, and quickly was on the mend. After a brief stop at the home of an APL foster family for some time, attention and love, this adorable boy with the mega-watt smile was ready to go!

When William and Kellie saw him in his kennel, it was love at first sight. Over the next few days, as he got his medical clearance, William and Kellie brought his future canine "siblings" in to the shelter for "meet and greets," to make sure they'd all get along. Each day, Kellie recalls, Blue got a little more excited. "The first day it was 'Hey, I've seen you!' The second day it was 'I know you. Can we play?' The third day it was 'Are you taking me home?'"

And home is exactly where he went. William and Kellie went to work buying him everything blue—a blue harness, a blue bandana, and even his favorite toy—a stuffed (and later de-stuffed) blueberry!

Blueberry has settled happily into a new routine, with plenty of people who love him. As Kellie and William make plans to start a household together, Blue gets love and attention from William and his family, and Kellie and hers as well. He gets along famously with the dogs at both households, and the humans, too. He even started something of a trend for William and Kellie—they recently adopted a three-legged cat from the APL!

Blue no longer has any reason to be, well, blue. As Kellie explains, "He has found a forever home protected from fear and pain." Congratulations, Kellie, William and Blue!

Everyday Adoption Center 5 Year Anniversary
