May, then known as "Fudgey," came to the Cleveland APL in September 2018. She was a little over a year old when the APL's Humane Investigations officers rescued her. Her fur was dirty, she had a painful skin infection, and the officers determined she was being neglected.

Jessi and her husband Jack had lost their beloved bulldog Tonka only months after Tonka had donned a tuxedo and stood up in their wedding. Jessi missed the patter of paws, and knew eventually they would adopt another dog. She came to the APL "just to walk around." Love struck, Jessi met Fudgey, and the feeling was mutual.

Jessi visited with Fudgey, who was a bit shy. Since she was found to be limping, the APL's veterinarian prescribed a stay with a foster family, to observe Fudgey, offer feedback, and give her some time in a quieter environment. Jessi and Jack agreed to be Fudgey's foster family.

In November, our veterinary team determined that Fudgey would need surgery on a ligament in her back leg, followed by physical therapy. As a nonprofit shelter, the APL is challenged by the cost of providing care for thousands of sick and injured animals every year. And yet, like Fudgey, they each deserve that second chance. The APL's Second Chance Program, funded solely by donations, allows the APL to provide more animals every year with the surgery, medication and therapy they need for a fresh start at a new, happy life.

Thanks to the Second Chance Program, Fudgey had her surgery, which was successful. Then, rehab began. Fudgey's care became a family affair, with Jessi, Jack and Jack's parents coordinating the trips for treatment. Thankfully, her recovery was smooth, and in late December 2018, Fudgey officially joined the family. She was renamed May, in honor of the month Jessi and Jack were married.

May's emotional adjustment to a safe, loving home was


a more difficult journey. For the first two weeks she was terrified of everything. She "army crawled" through the house and shook when she was allowed up on the furniture. Jessi worked hard to anticipate her reaction and introduce things slowly. May began to relax and to trust Jessi and Jack, although she still jumps at things that are noisy or new, even wrapping paper. Old wounds can take time to heal.

May now takes part in pack walks, although, Jessi explains laughingly, she spends a fair amount of time in "time out." Her coat is shiny and soft, and her eyes are bright. She's working with a trainer to gain confidence. This Bulldog/ Mastiff beauty has made three friends that she sometimes

In 2018, the Cleveland APL's humane investigations team brought in 1,174 animals who either were voluntarily surrendered by their owners, rescued in the field, or impounded and held in protective custody awaiting permanent custody determination by the court. While cats, dogs, and an assortment of rabbits, guinea pigs, and other pocket pets, comprise the

quickly.

majority of these animals, we have also brought in chickens, pigs, horses, peacocks, tortoises, fish, alligators, snakes, turkeys, pigeons, fish, ducks, macaws, parrots—and a REALLY angry goat with really big horns! Sometimes these animals come in one or two at a time, and then there are very challenging times when dozens come in at once.

As you can imagine, cases like these stretch our resources and facility to their limits. To some extent, they always will. That means we need to embrace the unpredictable nature of our work and better position ourselves to respond to disaster, emergency, and large-scale seizure situations with less disruption to the rest of our animal operations and needs. And we have a plan!

As part of our upcoming and exciting facility renovation, we are incorporating two "flex" spaces. One will accommodate nontraditional "guests" while we explore longer-term placement options. The angry goat with big horns comes to mind! The other space will be designed to serve as back-up temporary, emergency housing for larger numbers of animals so we can help them without disrupting our ability to bring in and help other animals in need. While fairly simple in concept, the impact these flex spaces will have on allowing us to help animals with, arguably, the

As for that angry goat, thanks to the loan of a humongous, sturdy, rolling cage from our friends at Cleveland Animal Care & Control, we managed to help him. He was one of more than 200 "barnyard" animals, mostly chickens, that our humane investigators found living in terrible conditions in a small, Cleveland back vard. Yes, a city back yard! His name is now Nugget, and he, a turkey, a hen, and a duck were adopted together by a wonderful and experienced owner with a small rescue barn. Rumor has it that Nugget and Mr. Turkey are known to team up and terrorize unsuspecting UPS delivery people! In their world, that translates into living the dream!

You are the reason the Cleveland APL has come as far as we have, and you are the reason we will be able to continue to stay on the cutting edge of animal welfare and do even more. I hope you will consider joining us to "Unleash the Dream" for our next chapter of lifesaving innovation for animals. Thank you for making it possible for us to dream—for them.

Another Happy Tale

Fluffy: High Perches and High Hopes

They met in a café. She approached him from across the room, and... skritched his head!? Yep, that's right. This Happy Tale begins in a café. Not your average coffee shop, but rather a very special cat café.

Actually, for both Fluffy and Erin, the story began before that first encounter. Fluffy had been living in a bad environment, neglected and under-socialized, but his life took a hopeful turn when the APL's Humane Investigators rescued him. While Fluffy's physical issues mended quickly, his emotional wounds did not.

Erin was familiar with cats from tough situations. She once cared for a friend's cat, from a situation similar to Fluffy's. Erin realized that she had a special affinity for cats "who wouldn't thrive just anywhere, but specifically needed extra patience, lots of time, and a quiet home."

After he recovered physically, Fluffy was selected to go to the affoGATO Cat Café.

AffoGATO is a unique café in Cleveland's Tremont neighborhood.

Anyone can stop in during their business hours and enjoy delicious coffee drinks and delectable catthemed snacks. But there's more. Clients can also visit and meet adoptable cats from the APL by paying a small cover fee for an hour of feline fun. Of course, ultimately, the cats, the APL, and the affoGATO team all hope someone will fall in love and adopt them.

Just a few days after Fluffy's arrival, Erin went to affoGATO with her mom. Erin spotted a white ball of fluff on a shelf at eye-level, hunched up as small as possible. Erin describes Fluffy with affection. "He's mostly white with black spots, a black tail, and one black ear. He has big green eyes, with a permanently dubious expression." After being briefed on his history, Erin christened him Marshmallow Fluff, and took him home that day.

She then set out to painstakingly, oh-so-slowly help him adjust, and earn his trust. At first, he ate only at night and not in front of Erin; eventually, Erin could rest her hand on the edge of his bowl, and Fluffy would bump against it while he ate. He initially would only use a litterbox lodged in a mostly inaccessible place in Erin's bedroom, but, with time, he progressed to using it in a more convenient spot. Finally, he began to stay out a bit after dinner to play. He still stays mostly in Erin's room, but now sits with the door open and in plain view, often perched on the windowsill.

That windowsill no doubt appealed to Fluffy's love of being high up, evidenced at affoGATO, and confirmed by APL staff. Erin jokes that "Marshmallow Fluff has a great shelf life." Erin's great

affection for this troubled yet brave feline is apparent whenever she speaks of him. You can see it in his many nicknames, including "His Fluffiness," "Mr. Fluff Miser," and simply "The Fluff." She even has abandoned her bed for an air mattress in the living room, until Fluffy is more comfortable with her sleeping in "his" room.

Progress continues inch by inch. Erin accepts that "it's not clear if he'll ever be a lap cat at all." But she's focused on the positive. "The good news is he's just as adorable from a distance. It's fun to hear him chasing a toy around from the next room, or see him curl up on a blanket and yawn after finishing a meal. And it's very rewarding every time he does make a step forward, no matter how long it takes."

So while the tale of Fluffy and Erin is a story of a cool cat café, at its heart, it's a story of patience and respect and unconditional love.

And, of course, high hopes and high perches. Erin explains, "Eventually he'll be ready to hang out in the living room with me and just chill. Definitely looking forward to that day. I have some great shelves out here, waiting especially for him."

A TNR Milestone

Back in 2008, we were excited to share that the Cleveland APL's new Animal Welfare Clinic (AWC) had spayed/ neutered 1,000 community cats in eight months through our Trap Neuter Return (TNR) Program. Now, eleven years later, we are even more excited to share that this summer, our AWC hit another amazing milestone—50,000 spay and neuter surgeries through TNR!

With the help of local trappers, the Cleveland APL is able to spay and neuter thousands of community cats a year. Cats are humanely trapped by the caregivers, transported to the APL, given vaccinations, spayed or neutered, and then returned back to the familiar area they were trapped. This not only helps to reduce the birth rate of homeless kittens, but it also reduces "nuisance" behaviors associated with large groups of cats like fighting, yowling and spraying.

Thank you to the Kenneth A. Scott Charitable Trust, a KeyBank Trust, Imagine Humane, PetSmart Charities, Build-A-Bear Workshop Bear Hugs Foundation, Ohio Pet Fund, and the Ferry Family Foundation for believing in this lifesaving project and providing the start-up grants that made our AWC a reality. We are grateful to the City of Cleveland for providing funding to their residents that allows them to use the TNR program to sterilize Cleveland's community cats at a deeply discounted cost of only \$10.

Thank you, too, to the Kenneth A. Scott Charitable Trust, a KeyBank Trust, Bernice Barbour Foundation, Petco Foundation, Ohio Pet Fund, and The Ware Foundation who have provided support over the years that allows suburban Cuyahoga County caregivers to use the TNR program at that same low \$10 co-pay.


