The first things you notice about Kadeau's APL photos are his handsome face and his hesitant smile. Kadeau is a retriever with a shiny black coat and a fair amount of energy. When he was surrendered to the Cleveland APL in early 2023, it's a safe bet he had a fair amount of confusion and angst, too. Kadeau's owner had passed away, and the owner's widow found Kadeau to be too much to handle. Kadeau's life had included other dogs and children. All too quickly, he was on his own.

But Kadeau needn't have worried. First, the APL staff quickly fell for this handsome gentleman. He went on field trips with Pam, an APL volunteer and unofficial dog social director. Shelter staff noted that he was an easy walker, very sweet, and a "10/10 good boy."

With all that charm, it's no surprise that Kadeau was adopted shortly after his arrival. That adoption was a bit of a misstep, however, and his new owners returned him when they found that he had separation anxiety. That "do over" was most certainly a blessing in disguise. For Kadeau, the "10/10 good boy," his very best life was not far away. Kimberly was about to find him.

Kimberly and her husband, Mark, have been married for more than thirty years. In addition to their twin children, they have shared their lives with several well-loved dogs. Their first was puppy Maggie, an engagement gift to one another. Every dog after that—and there have been a number over the thirty years—was adopted either from the Cleveland APL or from Rescue Village. Dogs like Maggie, Ellie, and Cooper, whose personalities and loving natures enriched their lives.

and there—in the exact kennel they'd found Maggie the year before—was Kadeau. After an obligatory "meet and greet" with the family, including dogs Beau and Maggie, Kadeau joined the family.

Kadeau, renamed Tucker, came home when there were only a few days left in the school year. Kimberly, a school system employee, would have the whole summer to help Tucker adjust.

The adjustment did take time. Tucker initially seemed uncomfortable, Kim says, as if he was waiting to be returned. She addressed his separation anxiety

# **Letter from the President and CEO**

The Cleveland Animal Protective League has served as Cuyahoga County's humane society for the past 110 years. Most people know us for our animal cruelty investigations work, adoption and spay/neuter programs, and as an animal shelter. But today, we are more than a shelter; we are a resource center for the animals and pet families in our community.

As a recognized innovator and leader in animal welfare, the Cleveland APL is placing a high strategic priority on expanding efforts to prevent pet homelessness by helping pet families access resources and care that will help them to keep their family together. Ten years ago, we introduced project CARE, which stands for Community Animal Retention Effort. Through this program, we have been providing guidance and limited resources to incomequalified pet owners in the city of Cleveland. Now, with economic hardship facing so many at every turn, we are in the planning stages of expanding the assistance and services provided through project CARE. But we also must seek more proactive solutions, solutions that can help pet families before their situation becomes dire, for example when facing housing loss.

Our mission is to foster compassion and end animal suffering, and animals suffer when they lose their family, their home. And people suffer when they find themselves with no option other than giving up their beloved pet ... their family member.

Families with pets who cannot afford the higher rents and nonrefundable pet deposits that come with many pet-friendly rental properties often face insurmountable barriers to finding housing where their family can stay together. People living in poverty, senior citizens struggling on fixed incomes, and others facing a continuum of financial challenges often face devastating choices—losing their home and having nowhere to go with their pet, giving up their beloved, four-legged family member, or keeping them and becoming homeless or houseless ... and that happens. Animals suffer and people suffer.

Already this year, nearly 100 pets have been surrendered to the Cleveland APL because their owners were facing challenges with landlords or had already lost their homes and couldn't take their pets. Nearly 150 more were surrendered because their owners were "moving," which often means they're losing their home, but they prefer not to share more. This is happening across Ohio and the country.

With the goal of proactively increasing the number of affordable, pet-friendly rental properties and providing more options for pet families who need to rent, the Cleveland APL has secured bipartisan sponsorship for House Bill 277, which was introduced in September. HB 277 incentivizes landlords to offer pet-friendly policies for renters. If they permit cats and dogs to reside in their rental units, welcome dogs regardless of breed or size, and do not impose nonrefundable pet fees or additional pet rent, they will be eligible to receive an annual tax credit and to be listed on the tax commissioner's website as a pet-friendly landlord. It's important to note that HB 277 does not compel landlords to allow pets. However, if they chose not to permit pets, they simply will not qualify for the tax credit as a pet-friendly landlord.

I'm pretty sure that everyone reading this already believes that our pets are members of our family. This bill not only recognizes that, but also the incredible benefit they bring to people and our community. HB 277 is about helping animals and people—animals who are facing homelessness and people in crisis who need the company of their pets more than ever to help them through tough times.

Thank you to the primary bill sponsors Representative Juanita Brent and Representative Sharon Ray for sharing our vision that the human-animal bond is cherished and supported. We'll be working hard over the months ahead to get this bill passed into law. Until then, thank YOU for working with us to make our community a better and safer place for pets and the people who love them.

### **Ziggy: A Bunny Transformed**



Ziggy has become a star! He loves posing for photos almost as much as his new mom, Marsha, loves to take them!

Some animals surrendered to the APL are nervous, shy, or apprehensive, often because of their life experiences. But in May 2023, three little bunnies were surrendered because they were too friendly, as bunnies sometimes are known to be. They seemed to be part of a population explosion, and their owner decided that Little Diego and two of his brothers should find new homes.

The three brothers were not ordinary rabbits, though. They were Lionhead rabbits, small and beautiful, with long, marbled gray and white fur. Two of the brothers, Fred and Big Sven, were close pals. Little Diego was more of a loner.

Meanwhile, Marsha's heart was still mending after the loss of her chinchilla, Drakey. Drakey had lived to the ripe old age of sixteen under Marsha's care, far longer than the average chinchilla. He had been such a wonderful companion that, after some time, she decided to look for another small pet.

So, Martha visited the APL. Although there were no chinchillas, there were rabbits. Marsha had never had a bunny. As a devoted pet parent, she took full advantage of the knowledge and expertise of the APL staff, learning how to care for a rabbit, provide it with safe, comfortable living quarters, and feed it the best food and treats.

Marsha was drawn to the beautiful brothers. As she observed them, she could see that Little Diego was a bit of a loner. Since he'd likely be an only "child," she decided that he was the rabbit for her. Less than a week after he arrived at the APL, fluffy, handsome Diego went home with Marsha.

Marsha gave Diego a new name, Ziggy, a reference to the zig-zag markings on his luxurious fur. She introduced him to his room and began decorating it to his liking. After he slipped on the linoleum, she got him a large carpet, where he happily began racing around and "binking" (binking is a sort of rabbit happy dance where the bunny runs around fast, kicks up its rear legs to the side and shakes its head, sometimes leaping into the air with all four feet off the ground!)

While the staff of the APL taught Marsha the basics of rabbit care, Ziggy quickly cast off his shyness and began to teach Marsha and her friends the specifics of "Ziggy care." He loves to play hide and seek, hiding until Marsha comes to find him. When he needs some attention, he doesn't wait around. Instead, he nudges Marsha or her daughters, as if to say "Haven't you noticed the handsome bunny? Come and pet me." He likes to be groomed, but not just once a week as Marsha was instructed. Instead, he stretches out loooong for grooming and love and attention nearly every day. And, perhaps most impressively, Ziggy plays fetch. Marsha tosses a toy, and he brings it back to her. But he puts his own spin on it, playing "reverse fetch," where he throws the toy back to Marsha for her to catch!

A shy bunny no more, Ziggy is living a large, joyful bunny life with a very caring mom. Congratulations, Ziggy, on your wonderful, new home!



Also featured in videos at the event were William, an 8-month-old kitten with a fractured pelvis and dislocated right rear leg who needed cage rest and strict monitoring by a foster volunteer; Kevin Jonas, a 9-year-old Maltese mix whose severe matting led to open wounds that needed daily care to prevent infection; and Love, a 4-month-old kitten who was emaciated and had a severe upper respiratory infection and needed months of extensive medical care.
