

### Foggy's Future is Clear and Bright

The Cleveland APL's Humane Investigations team works diligently to end animal cruelty and neglect through education, investigation, and the prosecution of offenders. They rescue hundreds of animals every year from lives of abandonment and abuse. Foggy was one of those animals.

In June 2023, Foggy was found by the HI team abandoned and emaciated in a backyard. A pit bull terrier mix, Foggy was about two years old. You could see her hip bones and count every rib. She weighed just over 16 pounds. She was frightened by the world around her and everyone in it.

Foggy was taken to the APL. She was safe there, but found it nearly impossible to trust people, even the APL staff and volunteers. She slowly permitted a few staff members to walk and care for her. She was sent to a foster home to decompress—to give her a break from the shelter environment. Still, she remained withdrawn.

Kim saw Foggy's post on Facebook. She was moved by Foggy's story, but not able to adopt her. Kim's dog Buddy was 16 ½ years old, and Kim knew that their time together was winding down. She wanted her long-time friend, Buddy, to have peace in his remaining days and did not want to bring another dog home. Still, Kim was touched by Foggy's plight. In April 2024, Kim went to the APL to meet her.

Their first few visits went as expected; Foggy ignored Kim, then just barked at her. Kim persisted. She visited Foggy nearly every week, for 20 or 30 minutes at a time. Foggy remained unapproachable. After several visits, APL volunteer Suzanne offered to let Kim see how Foggy behaved with someone she knew. Kim decided to bring her daughter with her to meet Foggy. She immediately warmed up to her daughter, becoming playful, joyful, and affectionate. One day, Kim even found Foggy having lunch with the HI Chief in his office. These sights made Kim hopeful.

Kim's husband, Doug, began to join her on her visits. Doug speaks with pride of his wife's patience with Foggy. "It really was important to Kim," he explains, "I could see how much it meant to her. There was never a question in Kim's mind. You could see how determined she was to give this dog a good life."

Eventually, Kim's persistence began to pay off. Kim and Doug began to meet Foggy in the play yards, where she greeted them with some enthusiasm. By this time, Foggy had supporters in all quarters, including Kim's dad, who encouraged Kim to adopt Foggy when the time was right.

## Bennie's Blukb Letter from the President & CEO

You know that saying, "A picture is worth a thousand words?" Well, if this picture doesn't tell a story, I'm not sure what will.



The lengths to which some pet owners will go to ensure their beloved pets receive the care they need can be hard to describe with mere words. Despite financial hardships and other barriers to care such as access to transportation, technology, and other resources that many of us take for granted, kind, compassionate families routinely display extraordinary devotion to their pets, often sacrificing their own comfort and well-being.

It is not uncommon to hear of people who have prioritized their pet's well-being and are skipping meals, delaying or forgoing their own medical care, working extra hours, or going without basic necessities to afford veterinary bills, medication, or even food for their pets. Some travel great distances to reach low-cost clinics or charitable organizations like the Cleveland APL that offer discounted services to qualified pet owners. Others resort to crowdfunding, borrowing money, or seeking help from friends and family just to afford a single visit to the vet. In many cases, these sacrifices stem from the fear of losing a beloved companion and primary source of emotional stability.

Pets are family. The emotional bond between a pet and its owner is profound, especially for those facing financial instability. In many cases, pets provide companionship, emotional support, and a sense of purpose in challenging circumstances. This connection drives many pet owners to do whatever it takes to keep their pets healthy, even when faced with overwhelming obstacles. Even when it means walking a mile round trip from the nearest bus stop with your cat in a carrier perched on your shoulder.

And then, there are the people who finally are forced to make the painful decision to surrender their pets to an animal shelter. But shelters are filled to capacity and struggling to accommodate the increasing number of pets needing to come in. That means the most effective and compassionate way forward is to connect these people who love their pets to the resources they need to keep their pets in their homes and out of shelters.

The dedication of these pet families highlights an urgent need for accessible resources, such as affordable veterinary care, spay/neuter programs, and pet food banks, as well as greater public awareness about the struggles they face. But these progressive programs come at a cost. Only with your support can we devote more resources to ensuring that the value of the human-animal bond isn't defined solely by dollar signs.

The Cleveland APL's mission is to foster compassion and end animal suffering, but animal suffering isn't always about abuse or neglect. They also suffer when they lose their homes, the people they love, and find themselves alone in a cage. At the APL, we give them love and do our very best to make their time with us as positive as

it can be, but we are not their family and we're not home.

Thank you for believing in and supporting our mission and fostering compassion by working with us and providing support that will help to keep these families together.

## Top Sirloin Gets Grade-A Medical Care and a Prime New Life!

Top Sirloin, a sweet six-year-old Tabby, was surrendered to the APL when her owner could no longer care for her.

Top Sirloin immediately captured everyone's hearts with her gentle purrs and sweet disposition. During what was expected to be routine spay surgery, the veterinary team noticed she was breathing strangely. X-rays revealed a heartbreaking discovery: Top Sirloin had very little lung volume because her liver and intestines were in her heart sac. This rare and serious condition, known as a Peritoneal Pericardial Diaphragmatic Hernia, meant that without expensive specialty surgery, she would struggle to breathe, and her life expectancy would be drastically shortened.

To help Top Sirloin, the APL turned to the Second Chance Program. Some animals come to the APL with serious medical conditions or injuries, needing extensive treatment or surgery. Generous friends of the APL donate specifically to the Second Chance Program, which enables the APL to pay for and provide specialty care to those animals

in great need. Thanks to this amazing program, Top Sirloin would get her second chance at a happy life.

Top Sirloin's delicate, open chest surgery was a success. The surgeon repositioned her organs and repaired the hernia. Top Sirloin recovered quickly and was ready to start her happy new life.

Luckily for Top Sirloin, Mike and Deb decided that it was time to add a pet to their family. The two of them are true

animal lovers who have had their share of both dogs and cats. This time, Mike and Deb decided that a cat would be a good fit for them. Deb bought cat supplies, then, one Monday morning in July, woke Mike and told him they were going to the APL to get a cat.

The pair went into the cat adoption room to see who might be interested in joining their family. They took individual cats into a smaller room to "interview" them. The first cat was standoff-ish. The second cat swiped at them. The third cat, Top Sirloin, was just right. She was all purrs and snuggles and seemed ready to go home. And only three weeks after her surgery, she did just that.

A new name for Top Sirloin popped into Mike's head: Dara. He did some quick research and found that the name means "gift" or "pearl of wisdom"—much more fitting for this tiny princess than her formerly meat-y name.

Dara adjusted to her new home quickly. In a matter of days, she had chosen several favorite places to nap, including any one of a half-dozen cat beds and at least one "human" bed. She has plenty of windows through which to watch squirrels and birds, and a basketful of toys from which to choose. Recently, she discovered another "toy," when she learned the joy of jumping into the bathtub chase her tail. But her favorite activity by far is cuddling. And her new mom and dad make sure she gets plenty of that.

Also featured in the videos were Carly, a four-year-old Boxer mix, who came to the APL severely emaciated and suffering from mange and patchy skin; Leo, a two-year-old cat who was found dehydrated and suffering with a displaced eye and jaw injury; and Pretzel, a sweet one-year-old rabbit who came to us with severe limb injuries, requiring two amputations.

Gisselle stayed with Betty and her family a little longer, then returned to the APL to find her forever home.

## From Volunteers to Vets: A Shared Journey with the APL

Two APL volunteers transformed their passion for animal care into fulfilling careers as veterinarians. Dr. Anita Grigor and Dr. Kristen Haynes first joined the APL as volunteers in 2012. Their stories, rooted in a shared interest in animal welfare, have come full circle as they now serve as valued members of the APL veterinary team.

#### **A Passion Ignited**

Dr. Grigor was inspired to volunteer at the APL after adopting her dog, Snickers. She began helping as a foster care volunteer and quickly took on more of an active role in the clinic as a volunteer veterinary support associate. Dr. Grigor said what truly sparked her passion for animal welfare was the welcoming atmosphere at the APL and the impactful work being done to help animals in need. She logged more than 3,300 volunteer hours!

Meanwhile, Dr. Haynes' journey started in 2012, when she joined the APL as a Pet Partner alongside her mother, Andrea, and brother, Matthew. Pet Partners are children from ages 9-15 who volunteer with the help of an adult. In 10th grade, Dr. Haynes volunteered as a dog walker, before progressing to fostering, and helping at special events. She soon became interested in becoming more involved at the clinic, returning for an externship during veterinary school before graduating. Haynes contributed more than 550 hours, and her mother and brother remain active volunteers to this day!

#### **Coming Full Circle**

Both women have returned to the APL as full-time veterinarians, ready to contribute to the mission that first inspired them. As part of the APL veterinary team, Dr. Grigor and Dr. Haynes are not only applying their skills but are staunch advocates for low-cost veterinary care.

Dr. Grigor said her favorite part of working at the APL is the ability to support almost every animal and client who walks in the door. "The APL has always held a special place in my heart," Dr. Grigor said. "Being able to help animals and families in my community is a dream come true." Dr. Haynes shares this sentiment, expressing that her favorite part about working at the APL is the focus on supporting families that need care for their pets, no matter their economic background. While veterinary care can become costly, the APL works to make sure that animals receive the medical attention they need and deserve.

"I am proud to work at an establishment in my hometown that strives to keep pets happy and healthy and with their families," said Dr. Haynes. "No one should be denied the happiness and unconditional love of responsibly owning a pet due to economic hardships."

As they continue to inspire others, Dr. Grigor and Dr. Haynes are not just veterinarians; they are a testament to the impact of compassion and dedication in the world of animal care.
