Danielle was thinking about getting a dog after her Labrador Retriever passed away. She loved him dearly, but, of course, he couldn't be replaced. Danielle thought it might be time for a different kind of dog. She began doing research.


The more she read about Doberman Pinschers, the more convinced Danielle was that a "Dobie" would be a good choice. Danielle learned that Dobermans are very intelligent and in tune with their owners. Her research made up her mind: She would adopt a Doberman puppy.

Adopting a Doberman from an animal shelter might not be as simple as it sounds. Dobermans, particularly purebred Dobermans, don't turn up in shelters regularly. They are kind of a "once-in-a-blue-moon" shelter dog.

But in Greater Cleveland, the stars were beginning to align for the appearance of some hard-to-find shelter dogs. A beautiful Doberman Pinscher had five puppies. The owner found that the five squirming, active puppies were just a bit too much. He surrendered the puppies to the APL and agreed to have the puppies' mom spayed through the Cleveland APL's Spay Mom program.

The pups were quickly sent to a foster home to grow a bit more before heading out into the world. Luckily for the puppies, their foster mom was an experienced dog owner with a Doberman of her own! Some of the puppies needed medical care; the puppy rough-housing had led to some serious scratches. One puppy, April, had an abscess as a result. She also had pneumonia when she was surrendered. With the help of her foster mom, the APL provided medical care, and April mended quickly. It wasn't long before all five puppies were ready to find their new lives.

As it so happened, Danielle's sister-in-law lives next door to the puppies' foster mom. Danielle had told her sister-in-law of her decision to look for a Doberman puppy and days later, they appeared in the yard next door!

Danielle met April and knew she was the one. She adopted her and renamed her Luna, perfect for this once-in-a-blue-moon dog.

Danielle had DNA testing done that confirmed that Luna is 100% Doberman Pinscher. Danielle reports she has all the best characteristics of the breed. She is "the dog you hope you'd get," Danielle says. Even Luna's trainers have told Danielle that Luna is very smart and eager to learn.

Letter from the President & CEO

In a perfect world, every pet owner would have the time, resources, and knowledge to provide their pets with the care they need for a lifetime. But life doesn't always go as planned. Financial challenges, health issues, housing instability, and personal crises can overwhelm even the most well-meaning pet guardians. When that happens, the consequences for pets can range from unintentional neglect to surrender or abandonment. Humane societies like the Cleveland APL can help at this critical juncture—not as adversaries, but as partners.

One of the most powerful shifts in animal welfare in recent years has been the move away from a punishment-first mindset toward increasing emphasis on prevention and support. At the Cleveland APL, we recognize that supporting pet owners is often the most effective way to protect animals. By treating overwhelmed owners with empathy and dignity, we can strengthen and preserve the human-animal bond and create more lasting change for pets and the people who love them. This philosophy is the basis for our Project CARE outreach program, through which we provide basic resources and support to pet owners who come to us for assistance with their pet's care needs. But it doesn't end there.

Cleveland APL Humane Society Agents (HSAs) are specially trained to enforce Ohio's animal protection laws by investigating reports of animal cruelty, neglect, and abandonment; impounding abused or neglected animals who need immediate care or a safe haven; and working with prosecutors to hold offenders accountable. However, today, their mission extends beyond enforcement, seizure, and punishment. In cases where malice is not involved, pets are not at risk or in need of immediate care, and owners are willing, our HSAs often play a crucial, compassionate role—sometimes in conjunction with our Project CARE safety net program—by offering education, reasonable resources, and support, with the goal of improving a pet's welfare in the home before punitive steps become necessary.

The Cleveland APL and our Humane Investigations (HI) and Project CARE programs stand at the intersection of advocacy, animal care, community service, and humane law enforcement. The path to resolution can be a more complex path at times, but so are the situations we often encounter in the field. Whether we're investigating reports of suspected animal cruelty or neglect or proactively arranging support and education for overwhelmed pet owners, we are committed to finding the best possible outcome for pets and the people who love and care for them.

And of course, when that's not possible, we are here to bring in those animals, provide them with the compassionate and critical care they need, and seek justice for the animal victims of human indifference or cruelty.

Because Cleveland APL HSAs enforce Ohio's animal protection laws, many people assume our HI program is financed by government or tax dollars—but it's not. This critical work is funded by donations—donations like yours! And here are some other ways you can make a difference:

Volunteer: From fostering or walking dogs to event and office help, there's a role for everyone.

Educate: Spread the word about the importance of reaching out for help early and without shame, or report suspected animal cruelty or neglect to your local humane society or law enforcement.

Advocate: Support policies and funding that will strengthen animal welfare infrastructure and enhance animal protection and pet support laws in our community.

Thank you for your support and belief in our mission of fostering compassion and ending animal suffering. Without you, we wouldn't be among the leading organizations in the country committed to addressing the root causes of animal suffering—and working to solve them with compassion, not judgment.



Featured Programs

The Salvation Army & the Cleveland APL Partner to bring Wellness Clinics to the Community

This summer, the Cleveland Animal Protective League (APL) partnered with The Salvation Army of Greater Cleveland

to host a series of free pet vaccine and microchip clinics for Cleveland and East Cleveland residents. The first clinic took place on Saturday, May 24, at The Salvation Army East Cleveland Corps Community Center on Doan Avenue. It was followed by additional clinics in June and July. Each clinic served up to 100 pets on a first-come, first-serve basis, and all events drew strong participation from Cleveland and East Cleveland residents.

These events provided much-needed preventive care to dogs and cats between the ages of six months and six years—the age group considered most at risk for preventable diseases. Dogs received DAPP and Rabies vaccinations, while cats were vaccinated for FVRCP and Rabies. We're grateful for the support from Merck that made free vaccinations possible.

Our friends at Cleveland Animal Care and Control, also known as City Dogs Cleveland, played a key role in these events by providing free microchips for dogs, while the Cleveland APL provided free microchips for cats.

"This was a vital opportunity for families to protect their pets and help reduce preventable illness in our community," said Sharon Harvey, President & CEO of the Cleveland APL. "We're incredibly grateful to our partners at The Salvation Army, Merck, and Cleveland Animal Care and Control for teaming up with us to make these events possible."

As the success of the summer clinics has shown, this partnership plays a crucial role in supporting the health and well-being of pets in the community. Another clinic is scheduled for September 27, from 12pm to 3pm, at The Salvation Army Community Center on Grovewood Avenue.

These clinics are open to the public. Pets must be between six months and six years old. All dogs must be on leashes, and cats must be secured in carriers.

The Cleveland APL and The Salvation Army remain committed to providing access to preventive veterinary care for those who need it most—strengthening not only the health of animals but also the bonds between pets and their families.

Some matches are made in Heaven. Others are made at the APL, perhaps with divine assistance.

In early 2025, Madisyn suffered two great losses. First, her dog Daisy passed away. Then, shortly after that, her other dog, Shelby, died. Madisyn believes it was from a broken heart after Daisy's passing. The loss of her dogs hit Madisyn hard. Shelby, in particular, had been Madisyn's emotional support dog. The grief was overwhelming.

It came at a difficult time, too. Madisyn was moving to Cleveland to start college. She and her boyfriend Caleb would be getting an apartment. Madisyn knew that even if she was ready, the apartment would be no place for a dog.

Caleb has a cat of his own, Smudgy. He persuaded Madisyn to consider getting a cat of her own. She thought about it, and talked to friends and family, who encouraged her to look at male cats, who they said would be "sweeter" than female cats, or a kitten, for the same reason. They also advised avoiding cats with health issues. The couple went to the APL to meet some cats and see if any of them clicked with Madisyn. Paisley, a five-year-old female cat, was the first cat they saw, and it was love at first sight.

That Paisley would connect with anyone was something of a miracle. Paisley had been surrendered by her owner when the owner was being evicted.

Our Humane Investigations team became involved when we learned that more than 30 cats and four dogs were living in the same unit in horrible conditions. Several of the animals were not in good health.

Meeting Paisley pushed aside all the advice Madisyn had received. Paisley pressed up against the cage for some petting and even rolled over for a belly rub. Caleb walked through the shelter with a staff member, looking at other cats. Madisyn didn't see one other cat that day. She had found her match.

When Madisyn heard Paisley's story, it confirmed that Paisley was the cat for her. Paisley has health issues and scars, like Madisyn herself, who lives with chronic health conditions and has had several surgeries. Paisley, renamed Mandy, is getting better every day and has turned out to be exactly the cuddly comfort cat that Madisyn wanted.

Madisyn says that ignoring all the well-meaning advice and following her heart was "the best decision" of her life. With their similar names, Madisyn and Mandy calm and cheer one another. Madisyn says Mandy has "saved my life and given me hope." Madisyn's message for others is to not overlook the "imperfect pets," because they need care and affection too. As she starts college, Madisyn is happy to have her beautiful girl, "Mandy Candy," by her side.

Madisyn believes that Daisy and Shelby may have had a hand in sending Mandy to her. And who would argue with that? Thank you, Madisyn, for giving Mandy the life and love she deserves.
